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FROM THE HEADMASTER

St Aubyn's School has been a thriving preparatory school since it was founded in 1884 as a single-sex boys' boarding school. Until 1968, the pupils attended school on a Saturday morning from 9 am to 2 pm and it was not until 1970 that this practice was discontinued for Years 7 and 8.

Also in 1970, the boarding house was officially closed and the 12 remaining boarders departed. This was the end of an era of 86 years of boarding at St Aubyn's. The boarding accommodation was then converted into classrooms for the day boys. Another significant change came about in 1975 with the St Aubyn's School Trust formation. The trust was formed at the instigation of Mr Colley, who was rightly concerned with the School's future when he could no longer carry on. A Trust, a corporate body, can carry on its function without hindrance or interference by changing conditions and individuals. In 1995, the School admitted girls for the first time and has continued to grow and thrive as a fully co-educational day school for 520 pupils up to 13 years of age. Recently, the increasing success at 11+ (92% average selection in the past five years),

coupled with fewer external 11+ applications and excellent secondary schools, has meant that the School has seen dwindling numbers in Years 7 and 8 over the last few years.

Therefore, the Governors decided that the current Year 7 class will be the last at St Aubyn's and from 2023, St Aubyn's will be an age 3 to 11 school only. It is a brave decision to make, but the right one, bearing in mind the current financial climate, the outstanding results and the excellent senior school options available in this area.

For a bit of context, a little before Gordon James, my predecessor, started in 1993, the governors hired consultants to consider extending the age range to 16+. It was a non-starter. On Mr James's appointment, the balance of opinion of the Governors was for dropping the age range to 11+. However, being a 13+ school made St Aubyn's stand out locally. At that time (1993), if we had dropped to 11+, we would have had a problem because firstly, we were competing directly with the other local leading prep school, and less than 50% of the pupils were successful at 11+, so it made sense to keep the Years 7 and 8 functioning for those not able to secure places and for those considering Common Entrance at 13+.









As a result of this change at the top end and, as the number of registrations at 4+ are at an all-time high, the School will expand from three to four classes in Reception from September 2023. This change in the structure will free up resources and enable us to become a four-form entry school from Reception to Year 2 and then revert to three-form entry at 7+, with a maximum number of 21 pupils per class.

The School's motto from 1884 still reflects our approach to teaching and learning today: fortiter, fideliter, feliciter – bravely, faithfully, happily. We have always preserved academic excellence and remain faithful to the School's traditions, whilst being wise and prudent when looking at essential changes. We hope that the history books will state that, as a Governing body, Headmaster and Leadership Team, we made the right decision, at the right time, for St Aubyn's.

This year we enjoyed a record-breaking year at 11+ with so many children securing places at the schools of their choice. 13 children achieved a staggering 29 scholarships between them. Interestingly, our current Year 6 pupils enjoyed two stints of learning from home – perhaps we should always have remote learning! I take this opportunity to wish our leavers well in their secondary schools; I am sure they will all progress to bigger and better things.

I will say the same for our Year 8 leavers; well done and the best of luck going forward. To our Year 7 class who will become the last Year 8 class; enjoy the privilege and make it count.

At a strategic marketing and public benefit meeting, it was decided that the Colley

Scholarship, previously awarded to a Year 7 candidate, will now transfer to a Year 5 candidate in preparation for Year 6. The value of the scholarship is a discount on fees and their name on the honours board in the Reception area. The fortunate recipient must show sound academic ability, be exceptionally sporty or musical, have excellent manners, exhibit a happy disposition and get along well with their peers. It gives me great pleasure to present the award to Sophronia Ailioaie.

Mrs Demetriou and her SASS team have managed to reignite the committee and we have enjoyed various events organised during the year. My favourite was International Day; the weather was good and it was so heart-warming to experience all the different nationalities in our school. Thank you to all of you, your voluntary contributions have been valuable and we appreciate what you do for your children's school.

In September 2021, at the INSET at the start of the year, I asked the staff, "How long does it take to change four wheels on a car?" For a Formula One Team, the answer was less than two seconds. The Red Bull Racing Team holds the world record for a 1.88 seconds change on Max Verstappen's car at the 2019 German Grand Prix. I used the analogy as an example of the achievement of a high-performance team. When everyone plays their part to the highest level, we should get very close to excellence. We will continue to strive to develop as a high-performance team and I feel comfortable that our teachers have all given their best to help the children to achieve their potential. I thank all our teachers for their

efforts in ensuring the children's academic, physical, creative, and spiritual development. They are a committed and talented group and their professionalism, energy, and enthusiasm are thoroughly commendable.

The School's latest inspection is evidence that we are a high-performance team. The last full Educational Quality Inspection was in 2015, followed by a compliance inspection in 2017. As a result of the pandemic, this recent inspection was delayed by two years, a full seven years after the last Educational Quality Inspection. The latest Educational Quality Inspection was prefaced by a Focused Compliance Inspection in which we met the eight compliance standards. As regards educational quality, the school was judged excellent for the quality of the pupils' academic and other achievements and excellent for the quality of the pupils' personal development.

I am absolutely delighted with this result. It is a truly remarkable achievement and a credit to the excellent staff who work tirelessly to ensure we produce these outstanding results. It is also a reflection of the support we receive from the wider school community, which also makes these results possible.

I take this opportunity to thank the chair of governors, Mr Foster, and all the governors for their time and excellent direction and management. Their work behind the scenes goes unnoticed by many as they quietly go about their business despite being very busy; the support given to each committee and responses to every email help us move forward and make our School a better place – thank you!

FAREWELL TO KEN FARMER

Ken Farmer, a former governor, passed away at the ripe old age of 94 on 20 January 2022. The memorial service was held on 26 February.

Ken was instrumental in setting up the charitable trust that took over the School's running from 1975 after Harold Colley approached him to help with this.

His sons Simon and Matthew were both pupils at the School between 1967 and 1975, and Ken had already been involved with the School scout troop which Harold Colley ran. Indeed, Ken went with the troop on four successive two-week camps in Italy and Austria (1972–1975) to help out Harold and John Skinner with the task of wrangling nearly 30 boys between the ages of 11 and 13. Happy days and the boys were privileged to enjoy such incredible trips.

We are not sure exactly how long Ken served as a governor, but it must have exceeded 40 years. Add in his time as a parent, and his close association with St Aubyn's is more comparable to 50 years. His wife Win was also a founder member of the St Aubyn's School Society back in the seventies.

We are grateful for his many years of expertise contributing to St Aubyn's overall governance, especially the finance. His influence is still prevalent in the prudent application of the School's financial policies.

Our hearts are with the family as they reflect on his life.


Eknoor and Talia wrote beautiful descriptions of the beach.



MUSIC AND DRAMA

Yet again, the Music Department has been extremely busy and creative and live performance has, once again, been at the core of what we do.

Music classrooms have been filled with the sound of singing and this is central to our Kodály-based curriculum. Our team of instrumental teachers have had a full year of one-to-one teaching and continue to develop the very successful instrumental arm of teaching. The team of staff has demonstrated incredible flexibility and adaptability, ensuring that all pupils continue to achieve and enjoy all aspects of their music education.

A couple of new faces were added to the teaching team. At the beginning of the year we welcomed Mrs Cocks to the department as teacher for Pre Prep music, and Mr Webb joined our strong team of peripatetic staff as the new clarinet and saxophone teacher. In January Mrs Manthorpe-Saunders replaced our previous 'cello teacher, Mrs Liddle, due to her retirement. They are all phenomenal musicians and we were in a unique position to employ Mrs Cocks directly from the orchestra pit of the West End. Playing at such a high level has inspired our children and provided a direct link to professional musicianship.

Singing familiar Kodaly songs and games returned to the curriculum and included well known favourites such as 'Doggy, Doggy', 'Bounce High, Bounce Low' and 'A Kangaroo Sat on an Oak'. Seeing children play and learn through singing was a real highlight after such a long break due to the pandemic.

Not only did singing form the foundations of the curriculum, but new programmes of instrumental playing were devised, starting with the ukulele (a first for St Aubyn's). Pupils in Senior School (Years 7 and 8) had the opportunity to learn this wonderful instrument and challenge their coordination skills! Away from the classroom, an impressive programme of 12 instrumental and vocal co-curricular activities was devised and launched (Orchestra, Training Orchestra, Jazz @ 8 o'clock, Brass Group, Guitar Ensemble, Year

2 Singing Club, Junior Choir, Senior Choir, Staff Choir, Music Appreciation, Music Theory and Keyboard Club). This provides a backbone for so many performance opportunities and stretches our players.

No sooner had Mrs Cocks arrived than it was time to start preparing the Nursery and Reception Christmas productions. This was really exciting as it took place with a live parental audience for the first time since the beginning of the pandemic. Nursery children performed catchy 'It's a Baby' and Reception met some wonderful animals in their version of the nativity in 'Born in a Barn'. Both performances were a huge success and it was a joy to see an appreciative audience of parents filling the PAC with the sound of clapping.

The Christmas term culminated in the traditional Christmas Service at St Mary's, South Woodford co-ordinated by Ms Manser. Selected children from Middle School and the entire Senior School (102 children in total) performed a wonderful selection of nativity and Christmasthemed pieces. Of course, it included the wonderful array of co-curricular players, as well as biblical readings from LAMDA pupils (again, another first for the school). The congregation and church rang with the sound from a rousing performance of 'O Come All Ye Faithful' after which Mr Blom exclaimed, "Live music is back and it is stronger than it has ever been at the school!"

There were more firsts for the Lent term when singing in assembly returned to reflect themes of the week. Children were kept busy playing instruments, and our exciting new practical curriculum developed a new programme of recorder playing in Year 3 and Year 4 and glockenspiel playing in Year 2. Having had such a break from Middle School performances, it was a joy to see Year 4 perform their recorder piece 'Razza Sazza' in front of parents for their 'Make a Difference' day. Year 3 also performed their recorder pieces in class including the jazzy 'Mike Oliver's Tank Top'! Mrs Cocks not only helped Year 2 to play their tuned and untuned percussion instruments, but also prepared them for their first live production in collaboration with our





drama teacher, Mrs Beckley. The performance was entitled 'Wiz Wham Alakazam' and concentrated on the importance of team work. This was the first joint performing arts performance of the year and was a resounding success! All children had their time to shine and sang their hearts out in the PAC. This was undoubtedly another highlight of the year. However, there was no rest for the department as Year 1 had another St Aubyn's first: a live Spring performance! The Music Department and Year 1 staff composed a bespoke Springthemed concert all about what we celebrate in the Spring time, not only including Easter themes, but also plenty of chocolate!

Ms Manser was also kept busy preparing the musical elements for the Year 5 production of 'Peter Pan' later in the term, again in collaboration with Mrs Beckley. The story was told beautifully through song, dance and acting by this talented year group. The songs became favourites for all pupils including the touching 'Don't Look Down' where Peter Pan embarks on his first flying adventure with Wendy.

It was suddenly the beginning of the summer term and we burst into life with the return of the ever popular instrumental demonstration event. The PAC had standing room only and children and parents were delighted by short performances by our instrumental team. This has



meant that our timetables for instrumental study are nearly full already for September 2022 and we are in a unique position of having an above average recruitment for all orchestral instruments! Looking ahead again, auditions took place for the forthcoming programme of new co-curricular activities, including Junior and Senior Choir.

Rehearsals started in earnest for the highlight of the term – the Senior School production of 'Al-la-la-la-laddin' (yes, you did read that correctly!). Again, it was another first for St Aubyn's, as it included all Year 6 and 8 pupils with some Year 8's never having performed previously on stage in the PAC. It was a real





team effort and pupils demonstrated their independence by learning their lines and song words brilliantly! A popular song, 'Amazing Things' included the words "I believe that I can do amazing things, gonna make it happen," and my goodness didn't they deliver! It was a wonderful demonstration of musical talent. Every pupil had the opportunity to perform in front of their peers and parents. A real celebration of the musical achievements for senior pupils.

Celebration was certainly the theme of this term and Prize Giving provided another opportunity for Junior and Senior choir to perform in front of pupils, parents and teachers.



The uplifting 'Believe' with the words "I can do anything at all, I can climb the highest mountain" really did add to the occasion and did not leave many with a dry eye. Towards the end of the term, due to COVID, we once again had to demonstrate our departmental adaptability and recorded performances from all our Middle and Senior school co-curricular activities for the virtual summer concert. Brass group, guitar ensemble, junior choir, senior choir, orchestra, training orchestra, keyboard club, Jazz @ 8 o'clock and selected soloists all performed remarkably well and my thanks must go to Mrs Cocks, Mrs Sheikh and Mr Shute for their invaluable help to make this performance possible and able to be shared with parents by the click of a link.

No sooner had the term begun than it was time to say goodbye and musical final assemblies really did celebrate all that the children had achieved in their musical year. Pre Prep and EYFS pupils not only sang, but also performed movement pieces to music and played classroom percussion instruments. Middle and Senior School pupils sang songs from their production calendar from throughout the year and celebrated instrumental examination achievements.

I am very much looking forward to sharing our new musical events and activities for next year, and must thank my team of incredible staff, and congratulate Mrs Cocks on completing her first full year at St Aubyn's.

September saw the arrival of our new drama and dance teacher. Mrs Beckley, who directed three musicals at St Aubyn's this year. The first in the Lent term saw Year 2 perform 'Whiz Wham Alakazam.' The musical explores the wonderful world where wizards live in harmony at Sun Castle (for the most part), but when an evil army of ice creatures try to take over the castle and destroy their world forever, they have to work together like they never have before! The musical explores a range of key elements of the PSHEE curriculum and the features of British Values, Teamwork. celebrating differences, developing talents and democracy were just some of the topics that were covered in a fun and entertaining way! It was an inclusive performance, enabling every child to speak a line of dialogue, sing and dance and have

a moment to shine. It was even more special to have a theatrical performance in front of a live audience once again!

Later in the Lent term, Year 5 performed 'Peter Pan' the musical. Year 5 worked incredibly hard, imaginatively and collaboratively. The musical was divided into three sections and edited to enable every pupil to take part in the storytelling process and many pupils multi-role playing a range of magical roles from mermaids, wild warriors and pirates at sea! Year 5 performed with gusto, delivering an energetic and moving musical. They even created the backdrops for the production and every projected image was one that a pupil in Year 5 had created. It was wonderful to see the creative and artistic talent of the cast shine through in the set, as well as the performance. Year 5 also had an opportunity to design costumes for the production, taking into account













the colours the characters would wear and their significance to the role. Pupils also considered the textures of

the costumes and created designs that allowed the characters to move and dance freely on stage.

Next was the biggest production of the year, the Senior School Musical, 'A-la-la-la-la-la-laddin.' The musical was divided into three sections and edited to enable all pupils to be involved with the storytelling and ensemble scenes. This brand new version featured lots of fun comedy roles, witty lyrics and rousing numbers to get the audience's toes tapping. The cast performed brilliantly as an ensemble, working as a team to move items of set and props, as well as performing with energy. There were some exceptional performances with some children performing solo singing roles with confidence and flair!

In addition to the school productions, pupils in Year 3 and 4 have been developing a wide range of drama skills. Year 3 developed their characterisation skills and entered a world of pure imagination exploring 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory' by Roald Dahl and in the summer term they entered the wonderful world of Narnia by exploring 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe' by C.S. Lewis. Pupils also developed their group work skills, learning how to work collaboratively whilst devising scenes and exploring text in performance.

Year 4 explored a range of dramatic skills from building tension during 'Darkwood Manor' and exploring the thoughts of a character in role. Pupils also explored performing a range of poems from different cultures, using choral speaking techniques. In the summer term, pupils learned how to mime effectively and used their miming skills to create their own short films using placards, a melodramatic acting style, and music to set the mood of the scene.

A huge thank you to all of the staff who have helped the Drama Department this past academic year with work behind the scenes on the productions it is much appreciated!

The children brought in presents for the Salvation Army Christmas Present Appeal, placed them under the tree in the PAC and then the School Council once again loaded the minibus with all the donations, ready for them to be delivered to the Salvation Army in Walthamstow. An email from one of the leaders at the Salvation Army in Walthamstow, shows the impact of the children's generosity:

She said, "...We were able to provide toys to 1,450 children last December, truly brightening what would otherwise be a very difficult period of the year for so many."

The Prep School Council felt very strongly that they wanted to support the situation in the Ukraine and held a book swap/sale in aid of

UNICEF. The children brought in some books and a donation. Each child in every class from Nursery – Year 2 were given a chance to buy a different book during the school day. This was a wonderful opportunity to support those in need whilst developing the children's enthusiasm for reading and it was a great success.

On Onesie Day, children came in dressed in their onesies and enjoyed hot chocolate and a piece of cake whilst watching a Christmas movie in the afternoon. The money from this event went to the local Riding for the Disabled Association. The School Council were delighted to present the cheque to a local riding school and stables that supports the initiative themselves, and were lucky enough to enjoy a tour of the stables and the chance to meet the horses.

After making donations to the Epping Forest Foodbank, the children ended the term with a mouth-watering Christmas lunch, which they enjoyed in their colourful Christmas jumpers.

In the Lent term, Middle School pupils were buzzing about the Spelling Bee... and their hard work and commitment definitely created a buzz at our local neighbours', Haven House. The children raised an incredible £5,461.55 for the hospice, and were treated to a visit by one of the workers at Haven House. In a letter of thanks, Ginny wrote, "Your continued support means so much to our families, knowing that they have people in their local communities who think about them."



The children also supported the Place2Be Children's Mental Health week and got creative completing mindfulness activities to promote mental wellbeing. The School Council had the chance to take part in Mental Health Week to raise awareness for the wellbeing of all the children in the school. Using assemblies with the theme 'Growing Together' and activities in class such as the growth stories, they aimed to develop our understanding about the importance of mental health within our school community. The week culminated in having a 'Dress to Express Day' where staff and all pupils from Nursery – Year 8 had the opportunity to wear either their favourite colour or an outfit to express how they were feeling. Emily Thomas our Chair of the Pre Prep School Council said, 'It made me feel really happy inside to be wearing my favourite things'. Through the generosity of the donations, we raised £869.44 for the charity Place2Be who help children and young people get the emotional support that they need.

For Middle School, the fundraising year ended with an aerobathon, lead by a very fluorescent Mrs Beckley! She had the children and staff moving and dancing to some very popular music for half an hour — all in a good cause. The children had chosen the UNHCR Ukraine charity for whom to raise money, showing their understanding of their own impact on not just the local but also the wider community. LETTER FROM THE LIBRARY

It was an absolute joy to return to a full library programme this year, reinforcing the role the library plays across so many areas of development: creativity, research, building independence, wellbeing, empathy and of course, literacy and reading. It is a basic fact that education depends on reading, and school libraries have been evidenced to lead to improved outcomes for learners. Our main focus has been supporting the post-pandemic recovery, bolstering lost learning and creating as many uplifting reading for pleasure experiences as possible. In addition to taught library lessons from Year 3 onwards, we saw the return of in-person author visits and Book Week, competitions, reading challenges and many other events. During the Summer term, we also welcomed Miss Etienne as our new Library Assistant. She has integrated amazingly well and brought a real enthusiasm and energy to the Library team.

The Christmas term was a whirlwind of celebration; Banned Books Week, National Poetry Day, Black History Month and Nonfiction November. Pupils took part in debates, investigated various library resources and took part in the Paint-Chip-Poetry competition, which saw pupils creating beautiful poems inspired by the titles given to paint sample cards. Winners excitedly received copies of *Daydreams and Jellybeans: Poems to Read Aloud* by Alex Wheaton as their prize and were all featured on the Library Web App. Alex himself even tweeted us to congratulate the winners!

In March, we celebrated our whole school Book Week, which saw record levels of attendance at the Scholastic Book Fair! Pre Prep kicked off the festivities with a story time and draw-along based on *Bumble and Snug and the Angry Pirates* by Mark Bradley, while Senior School pupils hosted workshops for Middle School children at lunchtime. Teachers and pupils alike got into the spirit on World Book Day as we all dressed up as book characters and staff swapped classes for special story times



sharing their favourite reads. Bookish prizes were also awarded to pupils throughout the school who won the 'Design your own Book Cover' competition. With so many fantastic entries, it was very difficult to judge!

On 9th June, we celebrated Empathy Day in the library, focusing on the books *The Last Chip: The Story of a Very Hungry Pigeon* by Duncan Beedie and *When Sadness Comes to Call* by Eva Eland. There was much discussion of what empathy means, homelessness and how to cope with feelings of sadness when they arise.

This year, Middle School competed as classes rather than individuals in The Book Stack Reading Challenge. Pupils were required to read and review books to add them to their class 'stack' and the class with the highest stack at the end of term won a class prize. The challenge was the most engaging one yet with Library Monitors and Staff interviewing pupils every lunchtime about books they had read!

Year 6 pupils benefited from a new 'Reading for Wellbeing' unit in the Summer term. They filled out 'book boost' cards with words of reading encouragement and hid them inside library books for younger pupils to discover, created a collaborative peer-recommended reading list and read book extracts from the Empathy Lab website before discussing what characters felt and experienced in the piece.

Overall, it has been a rewarding return to reading, researching and recommending in our school library.

Middle School pupils enjoyed an assembly led by Guy Bass in the Lent term, introducing them to his books, hosting a Q&A and detailing his journey from reluctant reader to award-winning author. Guy read from his published books and performed unpublished poetry, and above all, had us rolling in the aisles with his hilarious hijinks!



Matty Long joined us in the library in May, hosting a number of presentations and workshops for EYFS and Pre Prep pupils; introducing them to his books, showing them how to draw characters step-by-step, as well as answering children's questions. We thoroughly enjoyed our day drawing unicorns, turbo bunnies and butterflies!

Author visits encourage reading for pleasure and support classroom learning, motivate readers of all levels and inspire pupils and the whole school community alike.





MIDDLE SCHOOL

September 2021 was the second warmest September on record for many years in the UK and the sun seemed to shine extra brightly on the first day back on the Middle School playground. Our children returned to school, buzzing like bees, ready to start the New Year.

All areas of the school community held strongly to the hope that it would be a full and comprehensive year of education, interaction and enjoyment. 2020 and 2021 were cruelly interrupted by the pandemic, hindering our children's full experience of school life. However, tough phases in life do not last – tough people do. St Aubyn's pupils and staff have certainly proven they have resolve, determination, resilience and desire to return to school after such change, with ardour and positivity. Such qualities in our tool kit have never been as essential and as all encompassed in our Mission Statement. More than ever our aim is that each child at St Aubyn's leaves our wonderful community having become:

- A self-confident, independent, inquiring learner
- A considerate, moral, versatile individual
- A sociable, responsible, tolerant citizen

This year our children have demonstrated many of these attributes in all the activities that they have been part of and in the learning that



they have embedded. They have dived into everything they do with determination. The teachers and I have spoken to the children at length about keeping their minds healthy and how important our wellbeing is, especially post-Covid when many of us — children, staff and parents in our community — have experienced a dent to our confidence.

The children are beginning to understand the importance of having a growth mindset. Each child in Middle School truly believes they can achieve what they desire in life with practice, and persistence. A growth mindset learns from mistakes and seeks the feedback to improve.







We talk about how we can always find a way to solve challenges and achieve our lifegoals by developing a growth mindset. Our daily practice is to give feedback to the children in lessons so that they know where they are going wrong. They try again a second and third time. "If at first you don't succeed try, try again," and more significantly, "If you do what you have always done you will always get what you have always got!" This quote symbolizes stepping out of our comfort zone. Do something different and obtain something different. Do something uncomfortable by taking a new leap of faith. The reality is we have to work at it. Sometimes that work is listening to ourselves.

"Pupils are encouraged to consider relative areas of weakness and have a sound understanding of how to go about addressing these in order to improve their progress, in response to regular and effective verbal feedback from teachers" ISI May 2022

In our first term, during one of our Thursday, Middle School assemblies, the children listened to Barack Obama's inspirational speech about dreams and goals. In light of this, each time the children are asked if they are ready for the day to begin, they endearingly shout out, "Fired up and ready to go!" This echoes the chant in Obama's campaign rally in the state of New Hampshire, and has galvanised pupils into action, which has structured the work ethic of Middle School this year.

The children are very aware that in order to achieve, there needs to be that extra desire to reach for the stars! Being independent, inquiring learners and versatile individuals is crucial to this end goal. Our assemblies have been a fundamental way of developing a feeling of unity and a positive culture among pupils and staff and a vehicle for affirming our Mission Statement.

Year 4 pupils completed a sponsored walk and organised a charity event, in the form of an assembly for parents, to raise money for UNICEF Ukraine. As part of the Make a Difference







Challenge, pupils took ownership of the entire project, choosing which cause and charity to support and researching the issues associated with the crisis to then deciding how they would raise funds to help make a difference. The fundraising event saw pupils selling delicious smoothies, informing the audience about the war in Ukraine and UNICEF's work, and dazzling parents with singing and recorder performances.

Using my earlier bee analogy, the newly-elected School-Committee, led by Dr Shamim and the Eco-Committee led by Miss Ellis, have been a hive of industry this year and truly have demonstrated that they are responsible citizens leading the rest

of the school. One of our many charitable endeavours was to 'Kit Out the Nation'. A van load of donated sportswear and equipment left St Aubyn's School stacked to the roof. The children's love for giving and absolute selflessness never ceases to amaze me. They waved the van off happily knowing a good deed had been done! A poignant moment. The money raised by Middle School this year was an almighty £8,134.04!

I have known most of the Year 5 children since their first day at our nursery. It has been an

absolute privilege for me to be involved in their educational journey once again, here in Middle School. Watching their performance of *Peter* Pan, in the second term was a truly emotional and a wonderful experience. The self-confidence each child displayed was an indication of their absolute trust of one another and of their adults supporting them. Indeed, using a quote from the book: "The moment you doubt whether you can fly, you cease forever to be able to do it." The children were flying and enjoyed their experience. Their scene changes and transitions were faultless and their acting abilities were tremendous. Another message the play projected onto our children was the importance of being happy; wings are the allegory. We are flying when we are happy!

During the PGL residential trip to Marchant's Hill our pupils experienced an action-packed programme of amazing adventure activities and fun challenges that were designed to help build friendships, connect with teachers, and start them on their path towards independence. Our



experiences boosted emotional and physical wellbeing, developed teamwork, strengthened peer-group bonding and gave opportunities for personal development through learning new skills. The children most certainly revealed their ability to tolerate, to be considerate, to show their versatility and to be independent. Schoolwork and homework halted for a few days, and the children were free to relax, be themselves and to have fun whilst challenging themselves physically and mentally. It was a special few days. The children were a credit to their parents and our school.

In summary, I have had an excellent year with the children in Middle school and the very special team of teachers and support staff. I will end with a quote from Clare Balding's 'Fall Off, Get Back On, Keep going!' which I recommended to parents as a good read for the children at the start of the academic year.

"Wear your cloak of confidence with pride. Have super stickability in any situation. Make patience your superpower and bake a cake of Kindness. You will emerge happier, more confident, and resilient enough to tackle whatever comes your way, because when you fall off the very best thing to do is to get back on and keep going!"

SENIOR SCHOOL

It is with considerable pride that I can say my first year of leading the Senior School has been extremely enjoyable and immensely rewarding. And what a year, culminating in an ISI inspection which resulted in St Aubyn's being judged as 'Excellent' for 'Pupils' Academic Achievement' and 'Personal Development'. In summing up our year, I hope to illustrate how the Senior School Department embodies such an amazing reflection of our school.

Looking back to September, our focus was to return to 'normal' and to make sure that not only were the pupils' academic progress and achievement at the forefront of our thinking, but also their wellbeing, after two incredibly challenging years. One of the unique aspects of Senior School is the opportunity it affords for pupils to experience what life might be like in a secondary school. They are expected to become more independent, to organise themselves, to think for themselves and to take on greater responsibility. From navigating a timetable, to travelling between lessons and more importantly (for the pupils anyway!) having their own locker to help manage their belongings. Expectations are high and pupils rise to the challenge. They are well prepared for the next step in their educational journey. As a result, their self-confidence, self-discipline and responsibility for their own behaviour are excellent.



As usual, at the start of this year, we welcomed our new Year 7 pupils. Knowing how daunting it can be to start a new school, it is important to help our students to build long-lasting friendships and to settle into life in Senior School straight away. To support the pupils to build bonds, we ventured to a local 'cakes and shakes' café, together with our existing Year 7 and 8 pupils. It is amazing how quickly friendships develop - especially over an ice-cream sundae! These bonds were solidified even further, with a trip to the Nuclear Races where the pupils experienced a day of muddy, wet fun! They had to rely on each other and work as a team, again building camaraderie using excellent cooperation and communication skills.

As well as these trips, pupils enjoyed several other expeditions. It is wonderful finally, to be able to extend our pupils' learning beyond the gates of the School, once more. Hands-on







experience is so important and invaluable! Year 6 explored the wonders of Woburn Safari Park in the Christmas term, studying animals and their habitats. They were also invited to take part in the Junior Citizens Project run by the London Borough of Redbridge. This is an excellent event during which our pupils visit workshops where they are taught how to handle situations such as knife crime and robbery. They also learn how to travel safely on public transport and what to do in the event of a fire at home. In the Lent term, Year 8 enjoyed being taken to the Epping Forest Field Study Centre as part of their geography topic on rivers. Over Easter, some children attended the Sports Tour to Manchester, developing their football and netball skills. A theatre trip to see the West End performance of 'Back to the Future' for all Senior pupils was a real success as was the end of Summer term celebratory trip to the very popular Adventure Island in Southend!

Going back to the start of the year, we give pupils the opportunity to stand for House Vice-Captains as well as School Council and Eco-Committee representatives. All these positions hold great responsibility. It never ceases to amaze me how eloquent, self-confident and enthusiastic the pupils are when standing and giving their speeches, in a bid to be elected by their peers. They think carefully about their proposals, have a clear understanding of what is expected of them and a real desire to bring about change. Experiencing democracy in action is important and all of the pupils are able to get a taste of this during the process. This helps them to have a better understanding of the significance of living in a democratic society and the value of their vote.

Being elected to a position of responsibility is just one way in which pupils are given the opportunity to develop themselves. Having been through two difficult years, we introduced the concept of Well-Being Warriors in Year 7 and 8. During the year, our oldest pupils joined younger children in the dining hall for lunch. It was wonderful to see how the Middle School pupils looked up to their senior counterparts, how they chatted comfortably to them and made new friendships within our school community. Year 7 and 8 pupils showed kindness, care and compassion towards the younger children and developed an excellent sense of togetherness.

The sharing of positivity has also been seen throughout the year in Senior School in our weekly assemblies. This year we invited pupils to nominate fellow students for acts of kindness by completing a slip for our 'Spread Kindness Like Confetti' box. Every week, there were many acknowledgements of acts of selflessness such as 'She makes me laugh when I am worried about something' and 'He helped me when I got stuck with the maths'. These nominations, coupled with our Senior Star awards given by teachers each week, help pupils to appreciate the less tangible, but high impact positive human qualities within school life.

Throughout the year, Senior pupils in their form groups, organise events to raise money for charity. This year presented a new challenge! Pupils are no longer permitted to bring food into school so the traditional 'Cake Sale' needed to be reinvented. I take my hat off to the ingenuity





and creativeness of each form. From coconut shies to penalty shoot outs, lucky dips and 'Soak a Teacher with a Sponge' (thank you to Mr Glover for volunteering for this!), so much fun was had by the pupils running the events and those that came along to support. I am pleased to say that we raised £392 for The Brain and Spine Foundation, £600 for ELHAP (children's charity) and The Alzheimer's Society, £227 for The Trussel Fund (a food bank charity) and £524 for the Starlight Children's Charity. These events are one way in which we can demonstrate our social responsibility towards others less fortunate and I guarantee that pupils always make an excellent effort to raise as much money as they can - the competitiveness between forms creates a healthy competition!

Talking of being competitive, we have enjoyed several House events during the year. The children are fiercely loyal to their Houses and these events are taken very seriously! So, when the Tug-o-War rope comes out, the pupils really do dig their heels in and try their best! Similarly, in the House Construction Challenge, the most creative brains were at work, trying to figure out how to build the tallest tower with craft paper straws, a pair of scissors and one metre of tape. This was not as easy as it first seemed! In addition to the House events, house points are awarded by teachers every day and these also go towards the enviable House Shield, awarded by Mr Blom at Prize Giving. The accolade this year went to York House many congratulations to them!

One of the many highlights of this year for



me has to be the excellent Senior School musical production of *Al-la-la-la-la-laddin*. Year 6 and 8 pupils showed such courage in their auditions, with each and every one of them taking part in this process. This is testament to the confidence they have to 'give it a go', even if they find themselves outside of their comfort zone. The children shone on stage. It was wonderful to have parents back again to watch their children performing, to share in their hard work and to see real talent in action. I know that Mrs Beckley (Drama) and Ms Manser (Music) were immensely proud of the children, as was I.

Of course, I cannot finish writing about the year without mentioning how successful pupils have been in gaining places at selective schools this year. We have had record success with every child that sat, gaining a place. This is quite incredible and well deserved. The teachers at St Aubyn's prepare the children for the 11+ with a real push happening in the Christmas term before the exams. However, success can only happen

if the pupils put in the effort. If they focus and concentrate. If they practise and listen to advice. All of this, together with the undeniable support from parents, has led to an abundance of excellent achievements. Scholarship awards reached an all-time high with 29 being offered to 13 pupils. There is so much to celebrate and be proud of.

I have worked at St Aubyn's for 13 years and in my time I have seen many changes and developments in the School, all for the benefit of the children. The one thing that remains constant is our wonderful pupils. For the first time, I have been honoured to share their final year with them. To be by their side and to watch them mature into responsible, young people, ready

to take on the next chapter in their lives. If you get a chance, please read our inspection report which exemplifies what our pupils represent. The people that they are. My heart bursts with pride. We have children going out into the world that are honest and respectful, that have an excellent understanding of themselves.
